

DIRECTOR'S CORNER

So Long and Happy Trails from ED Steve Cleary!



"This agreement will begin on 18 June 2012" - that's when it all started for me at Alaska Trails.

I was a stay-at-home parent at the time and my son Liam was just starting part-time pre-school. I ran into one of the Alaska Trails founders, Jack Mosby, at a bicycle and pedestrian safety training. Jack asked if I would like to work at Alaska Trails. So, I signed up for 15 hours a week and began figuring

out what was next for me and for Alaska Trails.

I was mostly keeping the lights on at the time, with the help of a small board of directors. We staged a robust conference in 2014, with too many breakouts. Some of the sessions had more speakers than attendees. But we hit our stride with the conference, even after COVID shut it down, and it is now an annual April event. Through the support of the BLM, we added the Land Manager Forum in November to bookend the trail season.

With the help of the National Park Service – Rivers Trails and Conservation Assistance program, we launched the Alaska Trail Stewards (ATS) program in 2015. One of the first events led by Blaine Smith had us using a bathroom scale to weigh boardwalk pieces that were going to be removed by helicopter. From those humble beginnings, and a lot of help from a dedicated cadre of volunteers, the program now hosts 25 events a summer and contributes significantly to the maintenance backlog for many land managers.

In 2018, we were fortunate enough to partner with the Anchorage Park Foundation and the Municipality of Anchorage on the Youth Employment in Parks (YEP) program – and that continues to this day. YEP employs nearly 30 young people a summer to work on parks and trails project in the Anchorage area, and Alaska Trails is proud to be a part of that vital effort.

Trail Tales began as a copy of the popular Arctic Entries storytelling series. In the month we started in 2016, there were four other non-profits trying to put on a similar event. We made it over the hump, and now during the winter months 150-200 people gather at the Museum to hear stories about adventures and connections. We have split over \$30,000 with our partners while bringing the community together.

The Alaska Long Trail has galvanized the organization and given solid focus on connecting trails

from Seward to Fairbanks. There have been many advocates and partners pushing for the projects and planning that will keep connecting the many dots across this beautiful strip of Alaska. Alaska Trails is poised to continue this great work, and I can assure you that we have a solid base upon which to do so – thanks to the generous support of the Rasmuson Foundation, the Mat-Su Trails and Parks Foundation, and the Race Across Alaska Winter Challenge.

I will be leaving Alaska Trails to take a position with the Renewable Energy Alaska Project (REAP). I was on the founding board of REAP nearly 20 years ago in my position with AkPIRG. I have long supported and admired their work and am passionate about bringing more renewable energy to Alaska. It was a difficult decision to leave Alaska Trails after more than a decade, and I am committed to completing my remaining time with Alaska Trails as well as planning for and executing a smooth transition for the organization.

FEDERAL CHANGES CAUSE CONCERN AMONG GROUPS, BUSINESSES

Recent actions by the Trump administration regarding grants and probationary employees have trail-related groups moving cautiously and assessing the impacts that have already happened.


One big concern is what, if anything, will happen to the Recreational Trails Program grants, a federal-funded, state-administered program that brings about \$1.5 million dollars a year to Alaska specifically for trails. While the program is administered by the state, it requires oversight from the Federal Highway Administration. A recent Anchorage Daily News story reported: "Four of 17 employees from the Federal Highway Administration in Juneau were laid off Friday afternoon, according to someone familiar with the situation who was not authorized to speak publicly." Other impacts on trails include the firing of staff from the U.S. Forest Service, the National Park Service, and the Bureau of Land Management. It is unclear how and if these changes will affect trail groups and access to trails by the public.

These moves may also be affecting some businesses. The Alaska Outdoor Alliance (www.alaskaoutdooralliance.org/) has been collecting information from businesses. The following is from a Facebook post by the group:

DOGE layoffs in federal land management agencies have begun. If the success of your business is

tied to functioning federal lands or your community benefits from seasonal workers and visitors to those lands . . . unless there's a reversal or slowdown of this train wreck, there could be a very challenging summer ahead. AOA is collecting stories of impacts real and perceived. SLOW CLIMATE CHANGE: STAY INFORMED, REDUCE SINGLE CAR TRIPS

ACT Climate change affects everyone, especially those who enjoy winter sports.

A warming climate can mean shorter snow seasons, and more extreme events like snow droughts and rain-on-snow events. These will just get worse unless we slow climate change, which means we need to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions.



One way you can help is to stay informed. Save Our Snow, established in 2004, is an impartial compiler and publisher of data on what the ski industry and ski resorts are doing to combat climate change.

The site and the "Green Resort Database" were first conceived by snow sports writer and researcher Patrick Thorne, who has spent the past

several decades collecting information on ski resorts around the world. Increasingly aware of climate change's effects on ski areas, and what ski resorts were doing to combat it, Thorne felt uniquely placed to bridge the information gap that was apparent in the general media and ski industry reporting.

Take a personal action

Carpool, bike, or take public transportation for your commute or to do errands. Each of these actions help reduce the number of trips taken by a single person in a car. While taking a car might be convenient, transportation adds almost 30 percent to greenhouse gases.

which are paid jobs, and its volunteer program. Tasks will vary and may include trail work, maintenance, fee station, or office work. Most positions begin in late May or early June. Some offices will start recruitment as early as March. While not directly trail-related, Senate Bill 105, introduced by Gov. Dunleavy, could impact trails and trail users across the state.

The bill would allow for an eligible applicant to nominate up to ten acres of available state land for a cabin site if that land is not included in the state schedule of land offerings.

My fellow Alaskans,

We ask your help in opposing Senate Bill 105 Recreation Cabins Bill. We should not sell off the 20% of Alaska that belongs to and is managed by the Alaskan People. If passed we could see effects such as.

- 1. **Loss of Public Access**: Selling public land can lead to restricted access for residents who use these areas for recreation, hunting, and fishing.
- 2. **Conservation and Wildlife**: Public lands often serve as vital habitats for wildlife. Privatization can threaten conservation efforts and disrupt ecosystems.
- 3. **Economic Impacts**: Public land supports tourism and local economies. Privatization might prioritize industrial or commercial development over sustainable practices.
- 4 **Long-term Sustainability**: Public lands managed by state authorities aim for balanced use and protection. Privatization may prioritize short-term profits over long-term sustainability.

GOLDSTREAM VALLEY WINTER TRAILS LOST TO MINING ACTIVITY

Fans of the winter trails on the east side of Ballaine Road may have noticed that some trails, especially the eastern end of the Tanana Valley Railroad Trail, have been lost to the Goldstream Creek Mine.

Eric Troyer (editor of this newsletter) and other trail advocates have researched the situation, but options for protecting any of the trails are limited. The most significant and long-standing trail is the Tanana Valley Railroad Trail, so the post focuses on that. Other trails in that area have less



history and/or have changed course from year to year. If you've been on the trail with the old wooden bridge, that's the railroad trail.

FAIRBANKS PARKS AND REC WINTER TRAILS CHALLENGE IS LIVE

The Fairbanks North Star Borough Parks and Recreation Department is again hosting its Winter Trails Challenge with a new award category.

The sign list was revealed in late December for this popular ongoing event, which is free and open to anyone. Registration is required to be eligible for prizes and awards. However, FNSB Parks and



Recreation will be switching software systems on January 6 from MyRec to CivicRec. Registration for this challenge will only be accepted through CivicRec once it is launched on January 6. Also, as of press time, trail signs 5, 9, and 10 were reportedly not out yet but were expected to be installed by or shortly after December 30. And for the first time there will be a Pawblazer Award for furry companions. More details to come.

The Fairbanks Trails Challenge is an all-ages, all-abilities, outdoor scavenger hunt designed to get you out with your friends and family to explore our wonderful local trails, both new and familiar. Each summer and winter season, Parks Department staff temporarily installs special signs in secret locations along a dozen or so local trails. While the signs are up, the public is invited to visit the trails and try and find the signs. Along the way hopefully you have a chance to learn new skills, see new places, and make positive memories.

Participants who find at least ten signs during the event can win prizes from local sponsors and the coveted Trailblazer Award. Participants under the age of 10 can find at least five signs to win the Junior Trailblazer Award.
